

Wrong time

Linux systems usually synchronise the time with ntp (network time protocol) servers. If the time is not correct, that means either the synchronisation process is not running or is misconfigured.

Linux mint/debian does not use the default ntp daemon, but instead uses ntpdate-debian to update the time. This uses configuration in /etc/default/ntpdate. However, when the full ntp package is installed, this uses the server list of the main configuration in /etc/ntp.conf

```
sudo ntpdate-debian
```

Set up time synchronisation

To install ntp, just enter this command:

```
sudo apt-get install ntp
```

This uses the default ntp servers from the distribution (debian). To add country specific ones, check <http://www.pool.ntp.org/> and add them by editing the default ntp configuration:

```
sudo vi /etc/ntp.conf
```

Afterwards, restart the ntp service using:

```
sudo service ntp restart
```

To check if the ntp service is synchronising, use

```
sudo ntpq -c lpeer
```

and finally to check the synchronization log:

```
grep "ntp" /var/log/syslog
```
